#### A Re-evaluation of the Classification of Henry V Pennies by **Dave Greenhalgh** (Grunal Moneta) April 2024

Some 15 years ago, when writing the Galata Guide To Medieval Halfgroats Galata Print 2010, I found a need to reclassify the halfgroats of Henry V class C into three classes C, D and E based on the portrait styles and crowns.

This worked very well and brought the issue into line with the gold coinages and placed classes A and B as Henry IV issues and class C as a transitional issue and classes D to G as true Henry V.

Whilst working on the latest series of Galata Guides, Galata Guide To Medieval Pennies, vol II Henry IV - VI I found that, similar to the halfgroats, the accepted classification of the pennies by Brooke then Potter, Harris and Lord Stewartby was somewhat flawed by basing classes C to E on the form of the annulet mark by the crown/hair (the present classification system used in the Spink Coins of England and in the J.J. North English Hammered Coinage vol II).


I would like to put forward the following as a better way of defining the pennies of Henry IV/V and V. Labelled as Types to prevent confusion with Brooke's classes.

The criteria for the identification of Classes A, F and G remains the same (with the exception of the Mullet and Lis York pennies previously of class G which I re-located to Henry VI Rosette Mascle issue) see BNS blog D Greenhalgh A Henry V or VI York Penny Conundrum 23 Aug 2023 and the addendum to same 26 Sept 2023.

**New Classification** (The old Brooke classification in parenthesis)

### Henry IV/V

Type A (Class A) September (?) 1412 - March 1413 found for London only.



It may be possible to further separate so-called scowling bust coins into a class B type alongside the altered dies of Henry IV but to date all the coins of this obverse die share reverse dies with the true class A coins.

Brooke's original identification referred to the Class A coins as Scowling issue and class B as emaciated but they became transposed at the printers and the error has been perpetuated ever since.

### Henry IV V Type B London Only

Altered Henry IV and Henry V dies September (?) 1412 - March 1413 found for London only. Henry IV light coinage London dies and Class A die altered by addition of a mullet over the pellet by the crown.






